Milwaukee author James Marten to discuss new book on the Sixth Wisconsin Regiment

(MILWAUKEE - March 10, 2025) Acclaimed Wisconsin historian James Marten's new book, *The Sixth Wisconsin and the Long Civil War: The Biography of a Regiment*, offers a fresh perspective on the impact of the Civil War in the Badger State by chronicling the journey of the Sixth Wisconsin regiment from its inception in 1861 through the early 20th century. Utilizing the extensive resources of ancestry.com and hundreds of pension records as well as numerous personal visits to battlefields and archives, Marten tells the story of the war through the experiences of some 2,000 men and their families – before, during and after the Civil War. "From the farms of Calumet County and the forests of Pierce County to the emerging industrial city of Milwaukee and the state capital of Madison, we learn how and why men were recruited to fight for the Union," Marten says. "This also is the story of the women, children and elders who stayed at home during the conflict, then afterwards dealt with the soldiers' successes and failures."

The Sixth Wisconsin Infantry—one of the elite regiments of the legendary Iron Brigade—was at the heart of some of the Civil War's bloodiest battles, from Second Manassas and Antietam to Gettysburg and the Overland Campaign. But their story did not end in 1865.

In *The Sixth Wisconsin and the Long Civil War*, historian James Marten reimagines one of the oldest genres of Civil War history, using the deeply personal stories of the regiment's 2,000 men to explore not just the war itself, but its long aftermath.
